





Little Coyote Pond Update

The Board of Directors is pleased to announce that the BSOA is moving forward with plans to restore the West Fork of the Gallatin River and Little Coyote Pond. The project involves taking Little Coyote Pond off stream, restoring the West Fork's fisheries, channel and stream banks, and dredging and restoring the Little Coyote Pond as a recreational facility and fishing pond. This will be a place where families can gather for picnics and swimming, children can learn to fish, and the public can enjoy the natural beauty of the area. With great proximity to the Community Park, this will be a valued asset to the Big Sky community, its residents and visitors alike. Stay tuned for updates on this exciting project!



Sustainability Spotlight



Understanding Big Sky's Diverse Ecology

There are many reasons why we choose to live, work, and play in Big Sky. The opportunities to get out and enjoy all that Southwestern Montana has to offer seem endless. If you live in Big Sky partially or full-time, you live in one of world's most unique ecosystems. The Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem (GYE) is like no other place on Earth. Roughly 22 million acres are home to the largest concentration of mega-fauna in the lower 48 states, which means we share the land with 67 species of mammals, alone. Because we are in such close proximity to the national park boundary, we often have encounters with our four-legged neighbors. Keep in mind, their habitat has been severely fragmented in the GYE due to increased and rapid development over the last several decades. It should come as no surprise that we must learn to respectfully cohabitate with wildlife, since we choose reside along their migration corridors and hunting grounds.

Quick GYE Facts

- States: Wyoming, Montana, Idaho
- 26 tribes have ancestral connections to Yellowstone including the Mountain Shoshone, Kiowa, and ancestors of the Crow. There are over 1,800 tribal cultural sites in the heart of the GYE
- Encompasses state lands, two national parks, portions of five national forests, three national wildlife refuges, Bureau of Land Management holdings, private and tribal land
- · Home to the largest elk herd in the world
- Number of Elk herds: ~7 herds
- Number of grizzly's in greater Yellowstone: ~728
- Number of Gray Wolves: ~530
- Number of Bison: 5,450

Living with Wildlife Tips

- Do not leave trash or food items out. This attracts both black bears and grizzly's.
 Bear-human contact can be avoided with a bear-proof trash cart and responsible food storage. Bears are most active between March and October.
- Keep your pets on a leash; there have been frequent run-ins with dogs and wildlife recently. Keeping your dog on a leash can prevent harm to both your dog and wildlife.
- Keep your distance; we know how exciting it can be to experience a wildlife sighting but running up to an animal to get a closer look can cause harm to both you and wildlife.

Bear-Proofing in Big Sky

If you have a blue trash cart from Republic, it is not bear-proof. In an effort to comply with our 2014 Trash and Bear-Feeding Resolution, drivers from Republic will be swapping out non-bear proof carts in the coming weeks on Mondays and Fridays. Please leave your trash cans out that day their drivers have a chance to swap them out for the appropriate bear-proof Kodiak cart. Bear-proof carts are required all year



long in the BSOA jurisdiction.
